no other weapon in the world can boast of possessing such a high spiritual quality as the japanese sword for over a thousand years the sword was revered as the very soul of the samurai warriors who wielded it commanding awe respect and an almost religious devotion the tumultuous events of modern japanese history and the nation's relentless drive toward technological advancement however irrevocably sealed the sword's fate and along with the samurai class the sword became an anachronism both culturally and militarily

this is a series of entry level lectures on the japanese sword and its history for those who are interested in studying japanese art swords the japanese sword was basically designed as a weapon but japanese swordsmiths imbued qualities of grace and beauty into the blades as well as functional superiority the intricate patterns of surface and texture formed by their highly developed forging and tempering techniques were made only in japan in the past the japanese looked at the swords as a spiritual symbol of samurai temples and shrines nowadays the japanese regard swords as a cultural art object made of steel varieties of the appearance of swords are closely related to historical events textures contours and tempering designs are characteristics of a particular school den 〓 of swordsmiths this is a series of lectures that discuss each period's history then talk about the swordsmiths schools that were active in a particular province at the time because of that each section starts with the history of the time it is necessary to discuss history to see the flow of the events that affected the sword's shape and style

the sword a treasured combat arm and symbol of identity status and courage has held a special place in most countries of the world the samurai however may have received unparalleled attention in the history of the sword this brief introduction to medieval japan demonstrates how the politically strong samurai shaped the view one held of battle following the abolishment of the samurai class the meiji restoration and the opening of japan to the west in the nineteenth century japan was anxious to move ahead with modern military equipment and the building of a national army few traditional swords were made and the japanese adopted western style cavalry sabers in the twentieth century the sword continued to be carried into battle as a supplementary weapon not necessarily practical for the battlefield but nevertheless serving an important function as a crutch for the heart the gunto or new army sword which was modeled after the samurai katana but modernized to conform to western standards was carried by army and navy officers and cavalry troops until japan's fall at the end of

world war ii this book focuses on the era that one normally associates with the medieval period it starts by exploring the history of japanese sword making the development of metallurgic science and the skill required of the swordsmith to forge a strong and battle worthy blade that adhered to the standards followed by the samurai warrior class it then covers samurai mentality and philosophy of sword fighting with respect to the battlefield use of the katana and the dynamics of japanese swordsmanship it summarizes with a history of the gunto new army sword and the practical and philosophical value this sword had to the twentieth century soldier the concluding remarks focus on the sword as a symbol of japanese culture knives swords and bayonets a world history of edged weapon warfare is a book series that examines the history of edged weapons in europe asia africa the americas and the middle east and surrounding areas before gunpowder increased the distance between combatants the book series takes a critical look at the relationship between the soldier his weapon and the social and political mores of the times each book examines the historical background and metallurgic science of the knife sword or bayonet respectively and explores the handling characteristics and combat applications of each weapon the individual books are excerpted from the previously published book a history of edged weapon warfare also by martina sprague look for more books in this series in the near future

the famed samurai sword nihonto represents the pinnacle of bladed weaponry in the japanese warrior s arsenal this book addresses the sword s intrinsic historic monetary military and artistic values the seven chapters for this particular anthology were selected from materials published in the journal of asian martial arts tharp s chapter details aspects of the nihonto that make it unique in the world as a valued objet d art protected by law codes specifically written to preserve these cultural relics even when made by contemporary master smiths dicristofano writes on sword sketchings which allow the human eye to view details of the sword blade often unnoticed because of the subtlety inherent in the work hoshino s chapter presents a overview of various blade types his focus on blades leads to the next chapter by richard babin on how to make a scabbard test cutting provides proof of the practicality of the sword and swordsman s technique peter ward utilized an ancient diagram of main targets for body cuts and modern technology to actually view the inner structures of the blade s path along these targets peritz s chapter presents the ainu an indigenous group in japan they incorporated blades made by japanese smiths according to their own taste goedkoop s chapter deals with another medium as the master craftsman creates wooden replicas of japanese swords as you read other books and articles about japanese swords or practice kendo or iaido or see highly polished blades in a museum the chapters here will enhance your knowledge and appreciation of nihonto and their intrinsic value

a double edged sword dachi nodachi tachi which are older styles of a very long single edged sword wakizashi a medium sized sword and the tanto which is an even smaller knife sized sword although they are pole mounted weapons the naginata and yari are considered part of the nihont family due to the methods by which they are forged japanese swords are still commonly seen today antique and modernly forged swords can easily be found and purchased modern authentic nihont are made by a few hundred swordsmiths many examples can be seen at an annual competition hosted by the all japan swordsmith association under the auspices of the nihont bunka shink ky kai society for the promotion of japanese sword culture traditional japanese long sword and various fittings the word katana was used in ancient japan and is still used today whereas the old usage of the word nihont is found in the poem the song of nihont by the song dynasty poet ouyang xiu the word nihont became more common in japan

no other culture has the sword been developed to such a level of technological excellence and attained such a position of spiritual importance as in japan as a cutting weapon the fully developed curved sword of the samurai is extremely effective complex traditional methods of forging conducted according to the ancient precepts of reverence and cleanliness of the shinto religion impart these qualities to the swords countless varying hues and patterns of the crystalline structures of steel which result from special methods of forging and heat treating are visible on the surface of a finely polished blade in these textures lies an extraordinary and unique feature of the sword the steel itself possesses an intrinsic beauty the japanese sword has been appreciated as an art object since its perfection some time during the tenth century ad

with the advent of world war i infantry rapiers or cavalry sabers had practically become obsolete on the european battlefields due to the introduction of machine weapons and tanks at the same time in japan the samurai sword experienced an impressive renaissance due to the growing demand of japanese officers for traditionally forged swords samurai swords for the material battle tells the story of the last samurai swords forged for battle and answers the question of why japan s soldiers entrusted their fate to these swords in the inferno of material battles impressive visual documents tell of the events of that time and allow the viewer to imagine the hell through which the soldiers of all warring parties went using the example of the

works of contemporary swordsmiths the author not only proves the art status of these swords he also examines the question of whether only swords from tamahagane can be genuine nihon to purists will be shocked by the estimation of a leading contemporary swordsmith who recommended that the japanese war ministry supply all swordsmiths with manchurian steel likewise the estimation of japanese swordsmen who fought to the death with their swords is likely to turn many budo devotees idea of the ideal fighting sword on its head based on the personal fates of japanese soldiers the author evokes the spirit of the last samurai the reader can understand how the japanese sword myth and the samurai s code of honor shaped the japanese society up to the time of the second world war and had a decisive influence on their actions by not looking at the swords in isolation but placing them in the focus of contemporary historical events this book differs from many reference books in this genre and complements the existing literature in a unique way competently and carefully researched it is for the connoisseur of the subject as well as for beginners or readers interested in contemporary history a real treasure trove and exciting reading to the end

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
